Award Winning Education Program Coming to Greater Lexington

Since 2005, more than 25,000 students have logged 75,000 hours participating in River Explorer. In Greater Cincinnati and Columbus more than 5,000 River Explorer students per year investigate and learn about river ecology, pollution, and habitat protection.

For many communities, schools are struggling to help students improve math and science scores. More teachers are using ORF educational programs to help them fill this need for their students.

With schools increasingly facing budget cuts to education they are looking for economically efficient ways to provide their students a rich academic experience. With education being most effective when students participate in the process through hands-on learning, our low cost high impact hands-on river and land-based programs enable schools to provide programs that meet their needs in this changing budgetary climate. Furthermore, the curriculum we use fulfills many of the STEM requirements teachers crave and also adheres to state education standards.

With River Explorer, students are in rivers and creeks investigating and performing field research. They are, effectively, junior scientists for the day, learning from riverbanks and getting into the water and use their hands and nets to catch aquatic creatures. The students hold what they catch and then place them in aquaria and other containers for close study. They also conduct water quality tests, examining different parameters to determine water chemistry values.
